Penis envy relates to the envy that men feel towards women for having a vagina. Karen Horney signaled that men actually had the feel of womb envy. She claimed that male overachievement was due to the overcompensation for inability to produce. She hypothesized on parental indifferences towards a child, arguing that an infant perception of events is the root to understanding neurosis. She argued that men had envy on the women ability to give birth and suckle the infants. She went further to argue that women envied men freedom on pursuing their interest because of their overemphasis on relationship.

She emphasized that neurotic needs were based on individual needs. She called need for affection and partner to enable one solve all problems. Another emphasis was the need for power, social recognition and personal admiration as a tool for moving against people. Need for personal achievement also contributed to neurotic needs as an individual may be desperate to achieve this.

The need to move away from people is another argument. This was due to need for sufficiency and an independent life. A neurotic can wish to discard other people to achieve this. The need for perfection was another point where people want to perfect their well being. Neurotic people may display fear of exhibiting flaws in their life. She depicted that men were
